













Key Learning: Lesson Sequence

1	<p>What is Jesus' good news about friendship? Jesus' incarnation is 'good news' for all people. ('Gospel' means 'good news'.) His life, teaching and ministry embody what it is like to be one of the people of God, what it means to live in relationship with God. Jesus' example and teaching emphasise loving one's neighbour — particularly the weak and vulnerable — as part of loving God. Jesus is a friend to the friendless. Jesus chose 12 men to be his world-changers, but they were not who people might expect. Jesus chose Matthew the tax collector as one of his 12 disciples, a man nearly everyone disliked (Matthew 9:9–13). Why was it a surprise? Christians teach that Jesus brought good news because he was a friend to those left out by other people and that Jesus welcomed everyone.</p> <p>Learning: Children will take part in a role play about tax collectors, pick 12 people they would choose as a team to change the world and read Matthew 9:9–13 and discuss the story of Jesus choosing Matthew the tax collector as one of his disciples.</p> <p>Questions: What do you think of Jesus' choice of world-changers. Why did Jesus choose Matthew? Why do Christians see Jesus' choices as 'good news'?</p>
2	<p>What is Jesus' good news about forgiveness? It has been said, 'There is no Christianity without forgiveness.' The big ideas of 'the Fall' and human sin are dealt with in the Christian Gospel by God's generosity (or his 'grace'). Christians believe God will forgive – all a person has to do is say sorry, turn around, start afresh. God longs for people to turn back to him. Jesus' teaching connects apologising with receiving an apology. This is also seen in the ritual of public confession as well as the practice of confession to a priest, with 'absolution' (where forgiveness is given). This is practised in the Roman Catholic Church, and also in the Anglican Church. Luke 6:37–38 - Jesus taught: 'Forgive and you will be forgiven'.</p> <p>Learning: Children will read Luke 6:37–38 and discuss the idea that God forgives people who say sorry and truly mean it.</p> <p>Questions: Should we forgive people who say sorry too? Do Christians think Jesus was good news because he gave God's forgiveness to everyone who was sorry?</p>
3	<p>What is Jesus' good news about peace? God can give you peace. Teach them Jesus' promise to his disciples from John 14:27: 'My peace I leave with you, my peace I give to you. Do not let your heart be troubled and do not be afraid.' Jesus' first followers went through many troubles, but they had peace in their hearts. Christians today find peace in their faith too. Jesus is good news, say the Christians, because he gives his followers peace. 'Peace' here is related to the Hebrew word shalom, which means wholeness or well-being, a form of flourishing; it is not simply the absence of conflict, but is primarily the result of being in a right relationship with God. This is the peace that Christians believe Jesus offers.</p> <p>Learning: Children will read Jesus' promise to his disciples from John 14:27 – 'Do not let your heart be troubled and do not be afraid' and discuss how they could apply this their own lives.</p> <p>Questions: Are there different kinds of peace? What do we mean by peace in my own life (in my heart?), peace with other people (no fights?), peace in the world (no wars?), peace with God for Christians (being forgiven)?</p>
4 / 5	<p>How do areas help us to forgive? Church buildings are supposed to help people to feel part of a community (to be friendly), to be able to forgive others and to be forgiven, and to find peace. There are also areas in our school we can take a moment for reflection (Reflection Corner) and peace (Peace Garden).</p> <p>Learning: Church building investigation: children will investigate how church buildings are supposed to help people to feel part of a community (to be friendly), to be able to forgive others and to be forgiven, and to find peace. Creating prayers and reflections: share some prayers or song-words Christians use to express what God gives them</p> <p>Questions: Discussing places in school: where is friendliest? Is there a place that might help you to forgive? Is there a peaceful place?</p>
6	<p>How do Christians love God and their neighbour? Examining ways in which Christians respond to biblical texts and teachings, and how they put their beliefs into action in diverse ways within the Christian community and in the world. Many Christians engage in charity within their communities; for example, from Leeds, where St George's Crypt has been helping homeless people for over 85 years. At Clipston we donate food to the Market Harborough Jubilee food bank and give money to the Children United's Karisalpatti project in India.</p> <p>Learning: Children will research St Georges Crypt and compare this type of charitable giving to their experience of charity at Clipston Primary.</p> <p>Questions: What do we mean by 'neighbour'? How can we practise 'loving our neighbours' within our community?</p>
8/9	<p>Assessment – using SOLO Taxonomy "Hex-perts" scaffolds.</p> <p>This term, children will also explore Salvation through our Easter service as a Christian celebration.</p>
