Francis Drake is one of the most famous admirals in British history and was a personal favourite of Queen Elizabeth I. Much of his time at sea was spent attacking and looting Spanish ships and pillaging and plundering their settlements around the world. Spain and many other countries considered him a pirate in the same way as we would Blackbeard and Captain Kidd, but to the British, he was a hero.

Pirates also had a strong code of honour, at least amongst themselves. They all had a vote in the running of the ship, rarely stole from each other, never gambled and were in bed early every night.

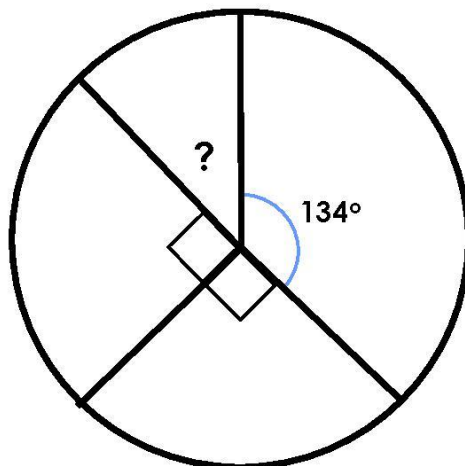

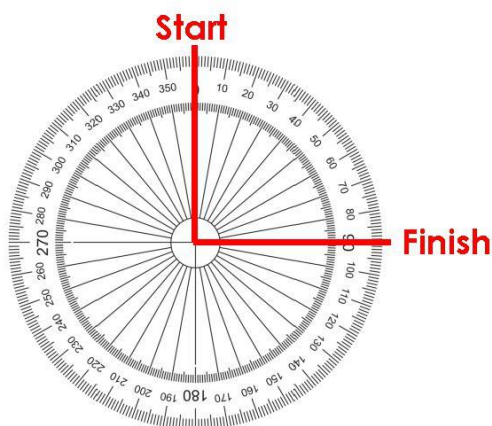
